This guide was co-created by a cohort of youth, youth organizers, teaching artists and artists in New York City invested in creating a world where resources are distributed equally, and the people that build the community benefit from their labor.

Our goal is to bring stories forward that move us from existing harmful narratives to narratives that build collective cultural power and inspire new collaborations that lead to sharing resources and wealth creation.

WHY THIS CREATIVE BRIEF, WHY NOW?

You write in order to change the world,
...The world changes according to the way
people see it, and if you alter, even but a
millimeter the way people look at reality,
then you can change it.

In the wake of a pandemic that has yet to end, New Yorkers continue to experience extreme inequities surrounding health, employment, education, and safety, disproportionately impacting communities with the lowest income. Racial inequalities fueled movements to address unjust violence against black and brown communities by the police. With the scapegoating of Asians for the cause of the COVID-19 pandemic, NBC New Asian America reported hate crimes against Asians in New York City increased by 343 percent between March 2020 to January 2022. To combat narratives that are divisive and harmful to our communities, we need to organize and tell stories that reach everyday people struggling to live under capitalism and white supremacy.

We organize because we choose to believe in a better future for New York City and we need more stories that help us see that future with more clarity. We need art that speaks to our hearts, our fears, our histories, our dreams, and our future. We need art that helps us imagine the world as if it could be otherwise. We need art that uplifts the wisdom of our ancestors and inspires us to co-create the conditions needed for our youth and our communities to thrive.

WE NEED STORIES THAT NOT ONLY REVEAL OUR CHALLENGES BUT CENTER OUR JOY AND OUR LOVE.

OUR PROCESS

The Youth Organizing and Culture Change Fund (YOCCF) brought together youth, teaching artists, and artists in New York City and The Center for Cultural Power to create a powerful cohort. As part of the cohort, facilitators from The Center of Cultural Power's Artist Leadership team gathered narratives based on the lived experiences and expertise of the cohort.

Four cohort members were contracted to draft the text of this document, expanding upon the core narratives the entire group brainstormed together.

With support from YOCCF staff, brief writers received feedback from the cohort on the text twice and the design concept once prior to the copy edit. The final product was truly a collaborative effort that represents the whole cohort.

OUR AUDIENCE

Nurturing Seeds of Our Future was created for youth, artists, and youth organizers on the cutting edge of radical imagination through fresh perspectives and exercising agency by those with the biggest stake in the future.

As the primary audience of this brief, we hope that the impact of this work has lasting effects on how current and future generations organize and create with joy.



Every person has a right to art, to creative expression, and to access and learn about the stories of their people.

Let's bring that art to our people, let's learn from the ways our people are already making life-affirming culture today. We need to challenge the dangerous, conservative ideas that are already taking hold in our communities.

Narrative or story threads are powerful storytelling tools for two reasons:

- Narrative threads are expansive enough for an artist to make it their own and specific enough to hold multiple stories together.
- As artists, we are constantly weaving stories about who we are, the ways we are connected, and how we build a future where we're all celebrated and invested in.

NARRATIVE ONE

WE HOLD EACH OTHER UP AND KEEP US SAFE.

In NYC, we face systems that criminalize and deport our people, tear our families apart, and leave us in a state of fear. Survivors of both state and interpersonal violence are left isolated and hurting.

Together, we weave networks of people invested in the well-being of one another. Safety, to our communities, looks like full bellies and adequate housing. When our needs are met, we are able to show up and stand up for one another. We keep ourselves safe by cultivating loving relationships with each other. When our people are caged, we fight for their freedom. We challenge the courts and district attorneys who call us guilty without sufficient proof. We stand up to the crooked cops who cover up evidence and threaten us with impunity.

It is our duty and honor to keep us safe because we believe that we are more powerful when we come together.

VALUES

Interdependence & Community

We are stronger together. When we ask for or offer support, we are modeling a loving way of relating to each other. Interdependence is key to creating conditions in our communities for the better.

Creativity

Creativity is a muscle that we must exercise every day and everywhere in our organizing. Creativity helps us imagine the world we want to live in and helps us reach and engage our communities effectively.

Protagonism

We are the ones we have been waiting for. Our movements are leaderful—not leaderless. Protagonism teaches us that we are all capable agents of change in society and that our role is to develop that protagonism in others.

Organization/Structure

Sustaining our work, ourselves and our communities takes commitment to organization and structure. To organize at scale, we need to build a vibrant movement ecosystem that helps us share resources and wealth.

NARRATIVE TWO

WE ARE ROOTED IN FREEDOM, AND TOGETHER, WE ARE DESTINED TO THRIVE.

New York City grew from the idea of freedom, but increased systemic inequities have hindered the city from being in full bloom.

Living in a constant state of survival ensures that we never have the capacity to think beyond the next day. It is impossible to think outside of the status quo when that reality is actively killing you. Only without the constant stress of how we survive, can we imagine how we thrive.

We are human and we all have the birthright of pursuing life with joy. We were born to be free from a culture of austerity and build a community with a foundation of abundance, love, and mutual support.

VALUES

Solidarity

Our power relies upon us, both as individuals and as components of our collective community. Only by holding strong to each other can we effectively become greater than the forces seeking to continue oppressing us.

Love

Caring, compassion, growth, accountability—all these things work together to create a revolution based on love, that truly seeks our collective liberation by ensuring that our most vulnerable never have their needs unmet. Our collective love for each other is a discipline that in practice creates resiliency, strength, and ultimately – joy.

Abundance

To live in abundance is to reject a mindset of scarcity and see true wealth in the well-being of your community. Abundance is having what you need, what fulfills you, and sharing that with your community.

Joy

Joy is a source of life, and we prioritize and value joy as essential as water to our growing movements. Joy allows us to acknowledge our blessings expressed in gratitude, love, and celebration.

PLANNING WITH SOVEREIGNTY AND MUTUAL AID: A SOCIAL CARTOGRAPHY OF CORONA, QUEENS

Using Roosevelt Avenue in Queens as a branching spine into the neighborhoods of Jackson Heights, Elmhurst, and Corona, the project will take place in the multiple pockets of neighborhood plazas and underutilized lots.

A temporary installation will display a series of oral histories that will transform and activate Roosevelt Avenue into a collective urban archive. By listening, responding, and engaging with the interviews and theme, participants will be able to tie individual narratives to the histories of activism, social justice, and care within their urban spaces.

NARRATIVE THREE

It is our responsibility to collectively shape our liberated futures, acknowledging that the work done by those before us is carried on, uplifted, and ushered forward by those who will come after us. As revolutionaries, this is critical to our why.

Why do we continue to fight for the tomorrow we dream of while knowing we may not experience the fruit of this labor? It grounds us, pulls the scope of our existence out wide, and shows us that we are not working in service to one another but rather in tandem. The ways in which we exist are dependent on our love and faith in one another.

VALUES

Mutual accountability

To truly exist in community with one another we must lean in in times of joy, in times of pain, and all the moments in between. Our freedom is intimately engrained in one another, and it is a sacred oath that transcends generations and moments and pushes us to take our collective wisdom and wield it responsibly.

Thus, the Center for Cultural Power's approach is to support and center the BIPOC artists whose powerful and authentic storytelling changes people's underlying assumptions and beliefs – and builds power for our communities to create change.


